### 1.0 Introduction / Background

- 1.1 A funding bid for the Local Transport Fund, Local Transport Network Fund and Active Travel Fund (LTF, LTNF and ATF) was originally submitted to the Welsh Government on 18<sup>th</sup> January 2019 in accordance with guidance from the Welsh Government. The funding bid was ultimately approved by the External Funding Panel and the Council was successful in securing £4.503million for the development and delivery of seven schemes.
- 1.2 The guidance stated that there was a total funding pot of £20 million for the Active Travel Fund, £27 million for the Local Transport Fund and £4 million for the Local Transport Network Fund in 2019/20. This funding is available to all Welsh Local Authorities. The Welsh Government elected not to set a maximum value for each scheme, but rather elected to set a banded scoring criteria, with higher values attracting a lower point allocation. Whilst match funding is not a requirement of the funding bids, it was made clear that those schemes that benefited from match funding would be more likely to receive an allocation.
- 1.3 The City & County of Swansea submitted bids totalling £16.859million, and the Welsh Government ultimately offered funding amounting to £4.503million on 15<sup>th</sup> May 2019 for FY2019/20. This funding was approved by Cabinet by way of an FPR7 report on 16<sup>th</sup> September 2019.
- 1.4 Subsequent to this initial approval, the Welsh Government approach Swansea Council in September 2019 to invite further bids for additional in-year funding (2019/20). Swansea Council therefore submitted additional bids for additional funding amounting to £3.161million on 20<sup>th</sup> September 2019. The Welsh Government subsequently offered an additional £2.755million on 7<sup>th</sup> November 2019.
- 1.5 Cabinet approval is therefore sought to commit these funds and the match funding offered to the capital programme in accordance with the Financial Procedure Rules.

### 2.0 Submitted Bids

2.1 Swansea Council received an invitation to bid for in-year funds from the Active Travel Fund in September 2019. Swansea Council subsequently bid for a further £3.161million on 20<sup>th</sup> September 2019. The details of this bid are set out in the table below.

2.2 A funding offer for an additional £2.755million was subsequently received from the Welsh Government on 7<sup>th</sup> November 2019. This funding will be used to deliver six of the eight additional schemes bid for in 2019/20. The bid and the successful funding allocation are shown in the table below.

### 3.0 Details of Schemes

- 3.1 The projects approved for funding from the Local Transport Fund 2019/20 are summarised below.
- 3.2 <u>Swansea Central Bridge</u> –Swansea Council is embarking on an ambitious programme to regenerate its city centre. One of the most prominent infrastructure investments will be the Swansea Central Bridge, which will span Oystermouth Road, linking the Swansea Central retail development

in the city centre with the new City Centre Arena. The bridge will accommodate both pedestrians and cyclists, providing off-road access for sustainable travel to and from these prestigious developments and linking the users with the existing shared use provisions adjacent to Oystermouth Road and linking to National Cycle Network Routes 4 & 43. The bridge will provide a nationally significant, prominent and conspicuous endorsement of and provision for active travel.

The funding allocation of £1.2million will be used to purchase the materials required to construct the bridge. Installation of the bridge will commence in 2020/21.

- 3.3 Gors Avenue to Broad Way (via Cockett Road) Shared Use Path The 1.78km of improvements to this section of the network will provide an important route in the channelling of pedestrians and cyclists towards the city centre from Cockett, Townhill and Tycoch in what are densely populated areas that experience significant levels of traffic congestion.
- 3.4 The route will run parallel to the A4216 and will be of great benefit to those attending the adjacent Gower College Swansea and for those continuing into the city centre.
- 3.5 The project will complement the Broadway Interchange project, which has been funded from the Local Transport Fund.
- 3.6 A48 Link This improvement will deliver a shared use path adjacent to the A48 from the Llangyfelach Roundabout (M4 Jn46) to Penllergaer (M4 Jn47). This 2.7km route would provide a substantive section of the Swansea Northern Cycle Route. The improvement would provide an active travel route parallel to the M4 between junctions 46 and 47, and will provide improved connectivity between Llangyfelach, Penllergaer, DVLA and ultimately Morriston Hospital and the wider strategic network.
- 3.7 <u>Mumbles Road \ Mayals Road Junction Improvement</u> This improvement will install two toucan crossings at the junction of Mayals Road & Mumbles Road. This is in service of two particular benefits. First, to improve an available walking route for pupils living in West Cross and travelling to Bishop Gore. Secondly the improvement will act as an enabler for further walking and cycling enhancements to Mayals Road which may follow in 2020/21.
- 3.8 <u>Loughor Bridge Path Widening</u> National Cycle Network Route 4 passes over the Loughor Bridge. The bridge is however too narrow to safely accommodate cycling and hence there are 'dismount' signs either side of the bridge. The proposed works will widen the footway on the bridge by narrowing the traffic lanes in order to facilitate continuity for the route into Carmarthenshire.

- 3.9 Gors Avenue / Carmarthen Road Junction Improvement This improvement will supplement the previously approved works to deliver a shared use path adjacent to Gors Avenue. This additional funding element will allow for widening and crossing facility at this junction for the improvement of provision and connectivity for walking and cycling.
- 3.10 The improvement will provide latent capacity for north-south travel to accommodate a shared use path on Carmarthen Road, for which the Council may seek funding in 2020/21.

### 4.0 Equality and Engagement Implications

- 4.1 The Council is subject to the Public Sector Equality Duty (Wales) and must, in the exercise of their functions, have due regard to the need to:
  - Eliminate unlawful discrimination, harassment and victimisation and other conduct prohibited by the Act.
  - Advance equality of opportunity between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
  - Foster good relations between people who share a protected characteristic and those who do not.
- 4.2 Our Equality Impact Assessment process ensures that we have paid to regard to the above.
- 4.3 An Equality Impact Assessment Screening Form has been completed. The outcome of the Assessment is that full Equality Impact Assessments will be required if these schemes are progressed.
- 4.4 All schemes will be designed in accordance with the national design guidance and will be compliant with the Equality Act 2010.

### 5.0 Financial Implications

- 5.1 The schemes described in this report, rely upon the Active Travel Fund to provide grant funding to secure their delivery.
- 5.2 All schemes listed in this report are 100% reliant upon grant to secure their delivery.
- 5.3 Claims are to be made to the Welsh Government on a quarterly basis. The grant must be claimed in full by 31 March 2020 otherwise it will be lost.
- 5.4 Any revenue costs arising from capital schemes will be met by existing revenue budgets.

### 6.0 Staffing / IT Implications

There are none.

### 7.0 Legal / Procurement Implications

- 7.1 When delivering Transport Schemes, compliance will be required with the relevant Highways and Transport Act measure and guidelines. The Active Travel (Wales) Act 2013 puts an obligation on local authorities to provide walking and cycling infrastructure.
- 7.2 It will be necessary to ensure that all terms and conditions attached to external grant funding are complied with and that the Council's Financial Procedure Rules Regarding Grant Applications and Acceptances are followed.
- 7.3 The land required for these projects is wholly owned by the Council.
- 7.4 Planning Consent will be required for the Swansea Central Bridge and this is already in train. All other projects listed in this report are expected to be delivered under Permitted Development regulations.
- 7.5 Separate legal advice will need to be sought regarding any contract and procurement issues relevant to the schemes.

### 1. Introduction

- 1.1 Section 100A (4) of the Local Government Act 1972 as amended by the Local Government (Access to Information) (Variation) (Wales) Order 2007, allows a Principal Council to pass a resolution excluding the public from a meeting during an item of business.
- 1.2 Such a resolution is dependant on whether it is likely, in view of the nature of the business to be transacted or the nature of the proceedings that if members of the public were present during that item there would be disclosure to them of exempt information, as defined in section 100l of the Local Government Act 1972.

### 2. Exclusion of the Public / Public Interest Test

2.1 In order to comply with the above mentioned legislation, Cabinet will be requested to exclude the public from the meeting during consideration of the item(s) of business identified in the recommendation(s) to the report on the

grounds that it / they involve(s) the likely disclosure of exempt information as set out in the Exclusion Paragraphs of Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972 as amended by the Local Government (Access to Information) (Variation) (Wales) Order 2007.

- 2.2 Information which falls within paragraphs 12 to 15, 17 and 18 of Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972 as amended is exempt information if and so long as in all the circumstances of the case, the public interest in maintaining the exemption outweighs the public interest in disclosing the information.
- 2.3 The specific Exclusion Paragraphs and the Public Interest Tests to be applied are listed in **Appendix A**.
- 2.4 Where paragraph 16 of the Schedule 12A applies there is no public interest test. Councillors are able to consider whether they wish to waive their legal privilege in the information, however, given that this may place the Council in a position of risk, it is not something that should be done as a matter of routine.

### 3. Financial Implications

3.1 There are no financial implications associated with this report.

### 4. Legal Implications

- 4.1 The legislative provisions are set out in the report.
- 4.2 Councillors must consider with regard to each item of business set out in paragraph 2 of this report the following matters:
- 4.2.1 Whether in relation to that item of business the information is capable of being exempt information, because it falls into one of the paragraphs set out in Schedule 12A of the Local Government Act 1972 as amended and reproduced in Appendix A to this report.
