- 1. Premises: Overdraft, 41 High Street, Clydach, Swansea. SA6 5LQ
- 2. Applicant: Mr Stuart Matthew Jones
- 3. Application for a Premises Licence
- 3.1 An application was received by this authority on the 24th April 2019.
- 3.2 This application proposes the following activities
 - a) Live Music both indoor and outdoor –
 Monday to Sunday 13:00hrs to 23:00hrs;
 New Year's Eve from 13:00hrs to 00:00hrs
 - b) Recorded music both indoor and outdoor Monday to Sunday 10:00hrs to 23:30hrs New Year's Eve from 10:00hrs to 01:00hrs
 - c) Late night refreshment Monday to Wednesday 23:00hrs to 00:30hrs
 Thursday to Sunday 23:00hrs to 01:00hrs
 New Year's Eve from 10:00hrs to 01:30hrs
 - d) Supply of alcohol on and off premises -Monday to Wednesday 10:00hrs to 00:30hrs Thursday to Sunday 10:00hrs to 01:00hrs New Year's Eve from 10:00hrs to 01:30hrs
 - e) The opening times for the premises -Monday to Wednesday 10:00hrs to 01:00hrs Thursday to Sunday 10:00hrs to 01:30hrs New Year's Eve from 10:00hrs to 02:00hrs

4. Background

4.1 The premises 41 High Street was formerly a HSBC bank. From December 2015 the ground floor of the premises became a licensed bar called Piccolo. That premises has now relocated to 42-44 High Street. The licence for 41 High Street was issued on 11th December 2015 and remains in existence allowing the provision of licensing activities detailed below. Mr Jones is not the licence holder.

The premises is situated on the main road through Clydach and within a mixture of residential and commercial premises such as shops, bars a veterinary practice and takeaways. Some of the commercial premises are directly next door to residential houses or have residents living above them.

A family run vibrant drinking establishment

7. Policy Considerations

7.1 In considering this application Members should have regard to the Council's current statement of Licensing Policy adopted in July 2018. Specifically in relation to this application;

(i) Deregulation – Foreword

(d) Certain activities are now no longer required to be licensed due to changes in legislation as a result of deregulation. Amendments made to the 2003 Act by the Live Music Act 2012 and the Licensing Act 2003 (Descriptions of Entertainment) (Amendment) Order 2013, Legislative Reform Order 2014 and the Deregulation Act 2015, means that a licence is not required for the following activities to the extent that they take place between 08:00-23:00 on any day:

Live music, where the live music comprises;

- A performance of unamplified live music
- A performance of live amplified music in a workplace with an audience of no more than 500 people; or
- A performance of live or recorded music on licensed premises which takes place in the presence of an audience of no more than 500 people, subject to certain conditions being met.

Recorded music, where recorded music comprises;

- Any playing of recorded music on licensed premises which takes place in the presence of an audience of no more than 500:
- Any playing of recorded music in unlicensed premises, subject to certain conditions being met.
- Dance no licence is required for performances on any day provided that the audience does not exceed 500.

Where de-regulated activities take place on licensed premises any licence conditions relating to 'live' music or entertainment will be suspended, but it is possible to impose new, or reinstate existing conditions following a review of a premises licence or club premises certificate.

(i) Control – Section 4

Paragraph 4.4 The Licensing Authority will primarily focus on the direct impact of the activities taking place at the licensed premises on members of the public, living, working or engaged in normal activities in the area concerned. It will be expected that any representation made by "Other Persons" will indicate how the application will directly affect them in relation to one or more of the licensing objectives.

Paragraph 4.5 Licensing law is not the primary mechanism for the general control of nuisance and anti-social behaviour by individuals once they are away from the licensed premises and beyond the direct control of the persons holding the relevant authorisation.

(ii) Licensing Hours - Section 7

Paragraph 7.1 When determining individual licence applications for premises the licensing hours will be decided having regard to the individual merits of each application. The presumption will be to grant the hours as requested unless there are objections to those hours raised by responsible authorities or other persons on the basis of the licensing objectives.

Paragraph 7.4 The Licensing Authority will closely examine the hours of business for premises which are situated in predominantly residential areas and will impose strict conditions relating to noise control where representations are received and it is considered necessary.

Paragraph 7.5 The Licensing Authority will allow shops, stores and supermarkets to sell alcohol, for consumption off the premises, at any time when the retail outlet in question is open for business. Limitations will only be imposed restricting the times alcohol can be sold from such premises if representations are received and there is evidence that the extended hours cause the premises to be a focus of disorder and disturbance.

(iii) Applications for licences, certificates, authorisations and reviews – Section 15

Paragraph 15.1 The Licensing Authority will consider each application received on its merits in the context of the four licensing objectives.

Paragraph 15.4 The Licensing Authority also accepts that Other Persons or responsible authorities, as defined in the Act, have the right to make representations in respect of an application, or to seek a review of a licence or certificate within the provisions of the Act. Such representations will be considered on their merits and how they relate to the likely effect of the grant of the licence or certificate on the promotion of at least one or more of the

licensing objectives. Also, how the representations are relevant to the promotion of one or more of the licensing objectives in the case of a review of a licence or certificate. When a petition is submitted as a representation it will only be considered if it relates to one or more of the four licensing objectives and it is demonstrated that the details of the representation have been made clear to each signatory i.e. that the heading is included on each page of the petition. A relevant representation may be positive or supportive in nature as opposed to being negative but it must still demonstrate that the licensing objectives are being promoted.

8. Guidance Issued by the Home Secretary

- 8.1 Members should also have regard to the relevant parts of the current guidance issued by the Home Secretary in April 2018, in particular;
 - (i) Introduction Chapter 1
 - (ii) Licensing Objectives Chapter 2
 - (iii) Applications For Premises Licenses Chapter 8
 - (iv) Determining Applications Chapter 9
 - (v) Conditions attached to Premises Licenses Chapter 10
 - (vi) Promotion of Equality Chapter 14 paragraphs 14.66 -14.67

Representations received include concerns regarding Crime and Disorder and Public Nuisance specifically in relation to the different hours of one licensed premises compared with the other in the village and the possibility of migration from one to the other after one closes.

8.2 Paragraphs 2.1 to 2.6 of the Guidance refer to Crime and Disorder and paragraphs 2.15 to 2.21 refer to Public Nuisance and in particular -

(i) Crime and disorder

Paragraph 2.1 Licensing authorities should look to the police as the main source of advice on crime and disorder. They should also seek to involve the local Community Safety Partnership (CSP).

(ii) Public Nuisance

Paragraph 2.15 The 2003 Act enables licensing authorities and responsible authorities, through representations, to consider what constitutes public nuisance and what is appropriate to prevent it in terms of conditions attached to specific premises licences and club premises certificates. It is therefore important that in considering the promotion of this licensing objective, licensing

authorities and responsible authorities focus on the effect of the licensable activities at the specific premises on persons living and working (including those carrying on business) in the area around the premises which may be disproportionate and unreasonable. The issues will mainly concern noise nuisance, light pollution, noxious smells and litter.

Paragraph 2.19 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11 pm and 8 am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise emanating from the premises may also be appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave.

Paragraph 2.21 Beyond the immediate area surrounding the premises, these are matters for the personal responsibility of individuals under the law. An individual who engages in anti-social behaviour is accountable in their own right. However, it would be perfectly reasonable for a licensing authority to impose a condition, following relevant representations, that requires the licence holder or club to place signs at the exits from the building encouraging patrons to be quiet until they leave the area, or that, if they wish to smoke, to do so at designated places on the premises instead of outside, and to respect the rights of people living nearby to a peaceful night.

- 8.3 Paragraph 14.19 There can be confusion about the difference between the "need" for premises and the "cumulative impact" of premises on the licensing objectives, for example, on crime and disorder. "Need" concerns the commercial demand for another pub or restaurant or hotel and is a matter for the planning authority and for the market. This is not a matter for a licensing authority in discharging its licensing functions or for its statement of licensing policy.
- 8.4 A copy of the Home Secretary's Guidance has previously been circulated to Members.

9. Determination Of The Application

- 9.1 The decision must be based on the individual merits of the application and the representations received, with a view to promoting the licensing objectives outlined in paragraph 5 above.
- 9.2 In addition in arriving at the decision Members should have regard to the relevant provisions of the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy and the Secretary of State's Guidance as previously provided. Reasons must be provided for any departures from the Policy or Guidance.
- 9.3 In reaching the decision the Committee must, having regard to the representations, take such steps mentioned below (if any) as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:
 - a. Grant the licence subject to:
 - i) conditions that reflect the operating schedule, modified to such extent as the authority considers appropriate for promotion of the licensing objectives. Certain regulated entertainment under the Licensing Act 2003 (as amended) has been deregulated. Where entertainment is deregulated, but licensable activities continue to take place on any premises, any licence conditions imposed on a grant of a licence in respect of any deregulated entertainment will be suspended.
 - ii) any mandatory conditions relevant to the licence
 - b. Exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates.
 - c. Refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor.
 - d. Reject the application



SIA licensed door supervisors shall be employed on occasions when a requirement is identified by the licence holders written risk assessment. Consideration will be given to large sporting events which are displayed on screens within the venue, public holidays and days considered to be major event days in the city. If a written risk assessment identifies that door staff are required the following numbers will be adhered to:-

In excess of 2,000 - at least 12 and such other stewards as may be required either by the Chief Fire Officer or the Council.

- 2. An incident book, bound in numerical order, shall be maintained at the premises showing details of the date and time of all assaults, injuries, accidents, interventions by staff or ejections, as well as details of the members of staff involved, the nature of the incident and the action/outcome. The book must be kept available for inspection by the Police and authorised officers of the Local Authority.
- No rubbish, including bottles, shall be moved, removed or placed in outside areas between 2300 hours and 0800 hours.
- 4 A Challenge 25 proof of age scheme shall be operated at the premises where the only acceptable forms of identification shall bear their photograph, date of birth and a holographic mark.
- CCTV will be provided in the form of a recordable system, capable of providing pictures of evidential quality in all lighting conditions particularly facial recognition. Cameras shall encompass all ingress and egress to the premises, fire exits, all areas where the public have access and any external areas. Equipment must be maintained in good working order, the system must continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain at the premises. Recordings must be correctly timed and date stamped and kept in date order, numbered sequentially and kept for a period of 31 days and handed to a Police Officer/Local Authority Officer on demand. The Premises Licence Holder must ensure that at all times a Designated Premises Supervisor (DPS) or appointed member of staff is capable and competent at downloading CCTV footage in a recordable format to a Police Officer/Local Authority Officer on demand. The

Recording equipment shall be kept in a secure environment under the control of the DPS or other responsible named individual. An operational daily log must be maintained, endorsed by signature, indicating the system has been checked and is compliant. In the event of any CCTV system failings the actions taken are to be recorded, and the Premises Licence holder/DPS must report the failure to the Police/Local Authority.

- A log shall be kept detailing all refused sales of alcohol. The log will include the date and time and reason for the refused sale and a means of identifying the member of staff who refused the sale. The log shall be available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer of the Council at all times whilst the premises are open.
- Premises to keep up to date records of staff training and refresher training in respect of age related sales including proxy sales, sales to persons who are drunk and identifying and preventing drug misuse, in written or electronic format, available for inspection on request by an authorised officer.



To whom it may concern:

I wish to make representations against the granting of the license application by STUART JONES, THE OVERDRAFT, 41 HIGH STREET, CLYDACH. SA6 5LQ.

As a business partner in one of the shops on the High Street in very close proximity to the above property I have these concerns:

- 1. Opening hours of 10:00 until 01:00 on Mondays to Wednesdays and 10:00 until 01:30 on Thursdays to Sundays. These hours seem excessive and not in line with current businesses and would lead to increased noise disruption for local residents and shopkeepers.
- 2. The inclusion of live music and outdoor alcohol sales as this will lead to excessive noise and disturbance to local residents and other businesses in the vicinity. There are many residential properties in close proximity.
- 3. The sale of alcohol for up to 15 hours a day does not fit with the current businesses in the High Street and would be detrimental to these local businesses with the possibility of loud behaviour towards passersby due to excessive alcohol consumption. This could deter customers from walking past the premises towards the other businesses close by. I feel strongly that this would negatively affect the current "family ethos" of the village's main shopping area.
- 4. The increase of litter e.g. cigarette paraphernalia, due to numbers of his customers smoking outside the premises and loitering on the pavements. These would also deter potential customers from walking past the premises towards the other businesses close by.
- 5. The effects of passive smoking on those living and working in the businesses adjacent to the above premises and on passersby and potential customers for the nearby businesses
- 6. Increased parking problems in the area- there are already numerous issues with vehicles parking illegally on the double yellow lines and zigzag areas of High Street close to the above property



I am writing to register my objection to the application for a premises licence by Stuart Jones for 41 High Street Clydach Swansea.



The applicant has also requested for indoor and outdoor sales of alcohol, playing music and live music performances again this is an area where families are living so the protection of children from harm comes into play as people will be drinking outside till 01.30 in the early hours of the morning.

In view of the above, I would urge the licencing authority to refuse the application.

We would like to raise objections to the granting of the licensing hours applied for by Mr. Stuart Matthew Jones proprietor of the above premises.

Mr. Jones has applied for a license to play Live music from Monday to Thursday 13.00 to 23.00 hours

Recorded Music Monday to Sunday 10.00 to 23.30 hours

Mr. Jones has also applied for a

license to serve alcohol and late-night refreshment from Monday to Wednesday 10.00 to 00.30 Thursday to Sunday 10.00 to 01.00. The council website advises the following

All applications for alcohol or entertainment licenses have to meet the four licensing objectives. These are there to help make sure the licence meets the public interest. The four objectives are

- the prevention of crime and disorder;
- public safety;
- the prevention of public nuisance;
- the protection of children from harm.

Clydach, like many communities within the County of Swansea has many public houses/wine bars, many of these provide live/recorded entertainment. However, these establishment, especially those in heavily residential areas, as the Overdraft is situated usually close at midnight at the latest at weekends and earlier Monday through Thursday

Having a licensed premise, situated in a heavily residential area, being allowed to keep the hours Mr Jones is requesting will we believe

Cause disorder into the early hours of the morning.

The longer people consume alcohol the greater the risk of noisy disorderly behaviour, added to this there is likely to be taxi's collecting people, engines running, car doors slamming. The Overdraft is adjacent to, opposite and close to many domestic dwellings, there is also housing for the elderly close by. Many of the residents of these dwellings get up very early for work, children have to get up for school. There is a very real risk the sleep of residents both adult and children is going to be detrimentally affected if Mr Jones is granted the late licensing hours he is requesting. Residents living in the elderly housing facility may well feel very vulnerable and frightened by any late-night disturbances.

Public Safety.

The more alcohol people consume the greater the risk of violence and anti-social behaviour. Unlike the city centre when, if excessive alcohol consumption leads to disorder violence, Clydach does not have a police presence immediately at hand to deal with any public safety issues. It would in allikelihood be some considerable time before police arrived to deal with any disturbances

Prevention of Public Nuisance.

Again, as with the above if the extended late drinking hours cause public nuisance there is no police presence to act as a deterrent or to prevent an escalation of anti-social behaviour.

Protection of Children from Harm.

As stated the location of the Overdraft is in a heavily residential area, the makeup of the residents is mixed, elderly people, single people, and many families with young families. If alcohol is served until past midnight and until 00.10, people in all likelihood would be leaving the premises probably around 20 to 30 minutes after 'last orders'.

As already stated there is likely to be taxi's collecting people, engines running, car doors slamming, people under the influence of alcohol being rowdy, (being woken up by happily rowdy people is no easier than being woken up by unpleasant rowdy people)

Sleep deprivation and disruptive sleep are known to have a damaging effect on physical and mental health, this is a proven medical fact. Studies have also shown children who are tired perform poorly in school. It is our contention, should Mr Jones be allowed the licensing hours he is requesting they will be harmful to children living locally, having a detrimental effect on the childrens physical and mental health and on their education.

In conclusion we feel, while the licensing hours Mr. Jones is requesting would be suitable for a city centre location, or a location in one of the cities tourist area e.g. the marina, they are completely unsuitable for a public house situated in a heavily residential village high street. A license of no later than 23.00 hours Sunday to Thursday and midnight Friday and Saturday would we feel be more appropriate

We are respectively requesting the licensing committee rejects the requests Mr Jones has made for late licenses for the reasons stated above



To whom it may concern,

I would like to object in reference to the new application for 41 High Street Clydach, Swansea SA6 5LQ, The Overdraft, this is based on the grounds of prevention of public nuisance. If this premises could stay open until 01.00 Monday to Wednesday and until 01.30 Thursday to Sunday, this is an unacceptably late time for residents. Noise at and after closing time is a public nuisance problem along with anti-social behaviour, low level nuisance – non reportable crime including shouting, swearing, urination in public, littering etc, will be increased.



Please find attached my email sent to the licencing department on Monday 20th May 2019 and after speaking with a member of your team Bethan on Tuesday 21st May regarding all the issue in my email, I would like to object to the premises licence for 41 High Street, Clydach.

As I explained to your colleague the blue sign put up at the premises does not represent what has been put into the City & County of Swansea regarding hours/activites & as discussed, we are unsure of the hours actually put into the local paper either.

If hours were passed by licensing it would have a detrimental effect on the shopping High Street in Clydach with regards to the prevention of public nuisance & public safety, this is a forma bank trying to be made into a public house & the location of this property is on a busy shopping High Street. This would involve intoxicated people being around vulnerable groups like the old age & children after school hours, as only 6 door away is a comic café used heavily after school hours by children until 19.00hrs, allowing people to drink for long periods of time such as the applicant requires would bring concern to me for the protection of children from harm as 10.00hrs in the morning until 01.00/01.30 in the early hour of the morning is excessive alcohol trading hours.

I am looking for some clarity in relation to a Premises licence application I am in the process of objecting to for 41 High St, Clydach, Swansea.

As you can see from the blue notice I have attached to this letter which is displayed at the above property, it states the hours of proposed opening are Monday to Wednesday 10.00 until 01.00 and Thursday to Sunday 10.00 until 01.30, however on your website the applicant has applied for conflicting hours, Monday to Wednesday 10.00hrs to 00.30hrs; Thursday to Sunday 10.00hrs to 01.00hrs; on and off premises which means the hours displayed at the property currently are different the hours held by the City & County of Swansea.

There is also a provision of late night refreshments Monday to Wednesday 10.00hrs to 00.30hrs; Thursday to Sunday 10.00hrs to 01.00hrs, this however this information is not stated on the Blue notice currently displayed at said premises, along with the hours proposed for live music and recorded music at set times.

I feel this information is purposely conflicting i.e. showing City & County of Swansea shorter hours of trading than the applicant intends to carry out.

Unfortunately I did not see the advertisement in the local paper so would like to know which hours were actually advertised as per your licence requirements, and feel this matter requires immediate attention due to the imminent ending of the consultation period being 22nd May 2019, and as stated above I wish to object on a number of issues.


