An application was made to this Authority dated 5 th September 2012 for a Modification Order under Section 53 Wildlife and Countryside Act 1981 to add a footpath running from Herbert Thomas Way (Trunk Road) to Herbert Thomas Way (Loop Road). The Council is under a duty to investigate and determine the application. Due to the age of the housing estate it is not possible to show uninterrupted use of the claimed footpath for twenty years and as a result the application does not satisfy the legal test under Section 31 of the Highways Act 1980 to meet statutory dedication. Common law dedication cannot be deemed to have occurred in this case as the landowner has not set out a path for use and has not encouraged the public to use the path. There is insufficient evidence to show use by the public at large 'as of right'. It is recommended that the application be rejected.
