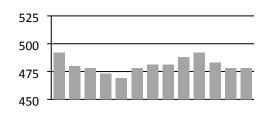
Where we are – at a glance...

There are **274** (266) Children on the Child Protection Register



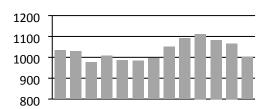
This is an **increase of 8** from last month.

Foreword from Head of Service

Dear Colleagues,

This is the first report for the autumn period and there is some indication the work we are undertaking in preparation for the redesign of Supported Care Planning (SCP) – timescale for full implementation being February 2018 - is beginning to see some results. With the schools returning September can be a very busy month, however it appears the volume of work is being managed effectively at our front door with a decrease in referrals this month. This has translated to a lower number of assessments being required and a decrease in the number of CINCS cases being carried within SCP. This is entirely consistent with our aspirations for the Family Support Continuum (FSC), with families receiving support at an earlier stage reducing the need for more specialist intervention from CFS.

The number of children experiencing care is slowly and safely reducing and we have returned to a downward trend, following a spike some months previously. Particularly pleasing this month is the low numbers of children entering the care system, that all children have care plans in place that ensure their future care needs are met and that all children, who require them, have pathway plans in place. As outlined in the report we will need to ensure and report on children and young people's participation in the development of plans and attendance and engagement in the review process. Yet again we have no children placed in B&B accommodation.

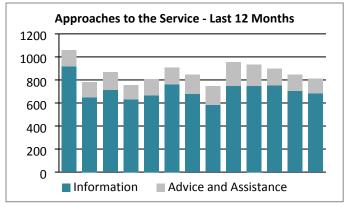
The number of children subject of a child protection plan remains at a high level, following a very bust period, but there are now some indications this activity is slowing and all children have a qualified worker and core group activity is at a high level. Performance has improved within the service quality unit (SQU) in terms of conference and review timescales and I would like to thank the newly appointed managers for their focus in this area. Finally improvement is required around assessment activity and the recording of statutory visits. I am aware there is now an action plan in place to build performance in this area.

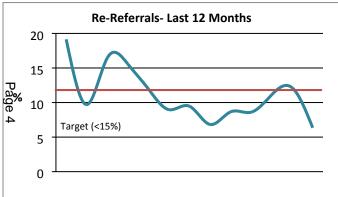
Finally just to thank you all for your hard work resulting in a good month's performance overall.

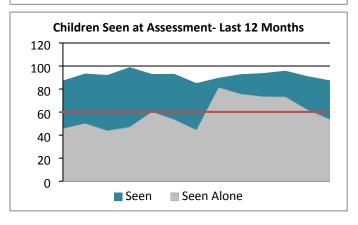

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Front Door – September 2017





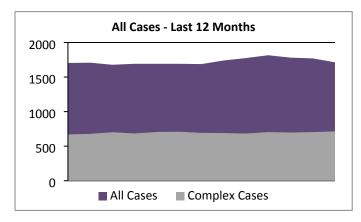


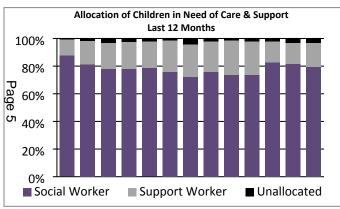

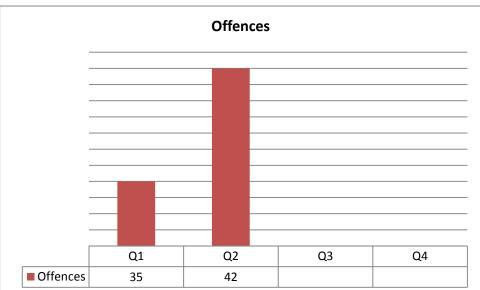


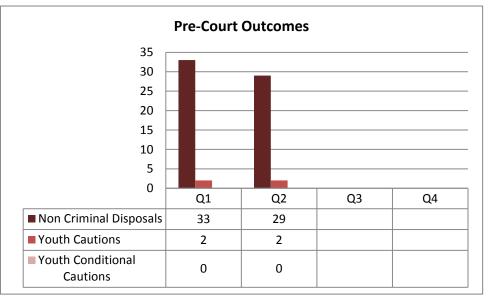


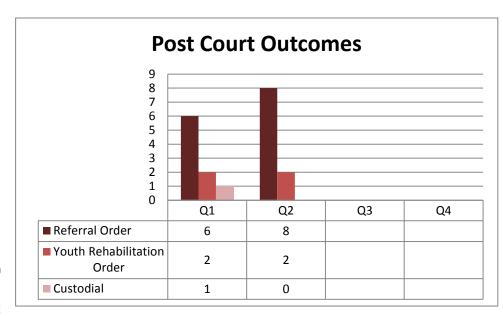
Youth Offending Service – Q2 2017/18









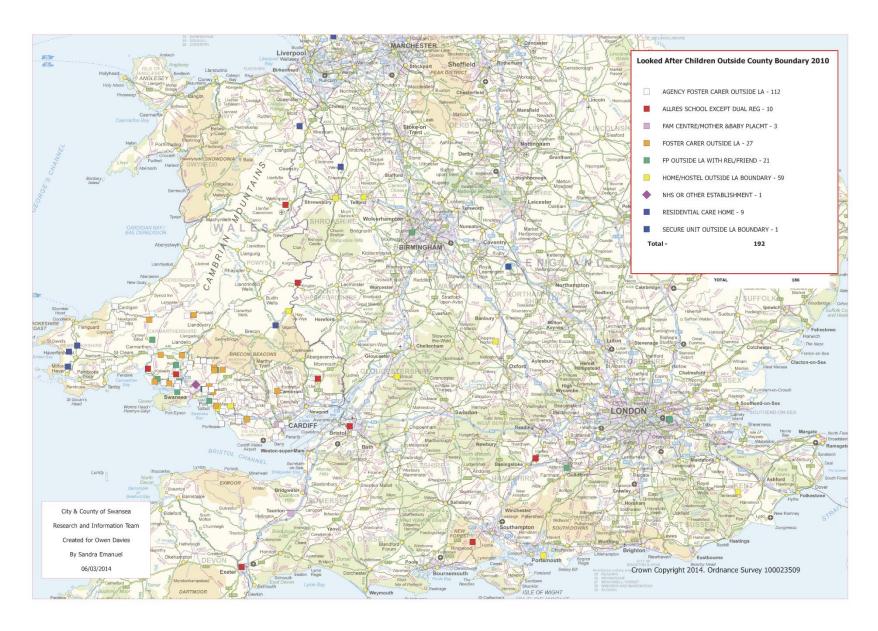

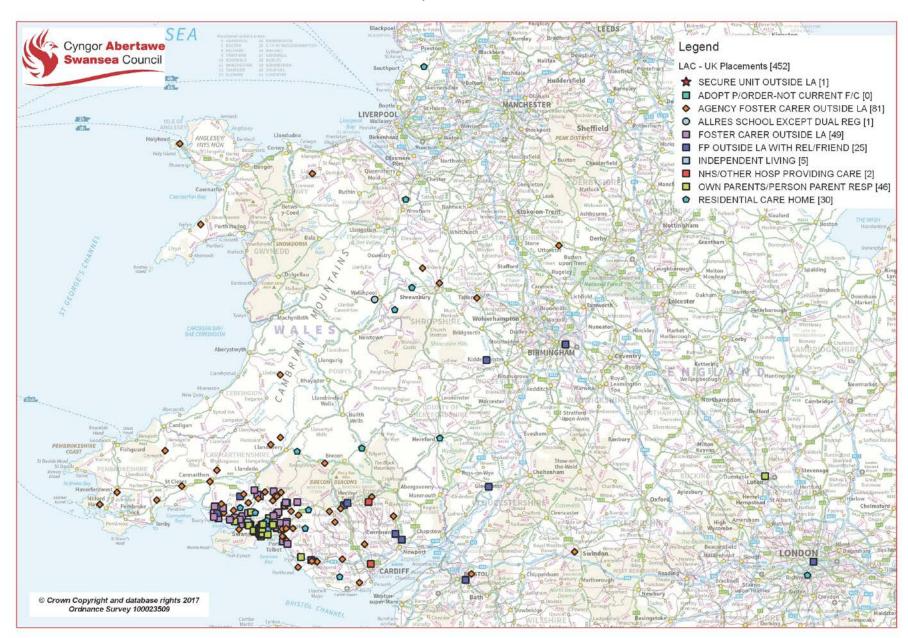
The use of custody is addressed by offering the court robust alternatives and the on-going work to reduce the risk young people pose to others.
