# **Education Scrutiny Performance Panel – SPC Update**

### 1. Remit of the Panel

The overarching purpose of the Panel is to provide ongoing challenge to school's performance to ensure that *pupils in Swansea* are receiving high quality education and the authority is meeting its objectives in relation to improving school standards and *pupil* attainment.

# 3. Achievements / Impacts

Four letters to the Cabinet Member for Education and Learning have been sent since the last update in March. Find below some of the views and issues raised following on from the previous update in March 2024.

## Religion, Values and Ethics Education

The Panel were pleased to hear that Swansea Standing Advisory Council for Religious Education (SACRE) has secured funding to improve the resources available to schools on the subject and that in Swansea we are further ahead than many other local authorities. Although this may be the case, the Panel felt there is a lot more to do to improve RVE in Swansea schools. This is evident from the declining number of pupils who are entered for examinations or taking the subject at GCSE and A 'Level. They understand that SACRE are continuing to investigate this decline. The Panel felt that it was important that they look at this again and will therefore put it into our work programme for next year, especially as it is a statutory requirement.

### **Hearing the Voices of Children and Young People**

The Panel were encouraged to hear about the amount of activity that is taking place not only in education settings but also more widely in the community to engage with and gain the views of young people. They heard that this is completed by both the education directorate and the Partnership and Involvement Team from Social Services. They were pleased to see the different ways in which young people's voices are gathered and then included in decision making here in Swansea. The Panel were particularly interested in how those quiet voices are gained and how they are fed into departments across the council.

### **Sustainable Communities for Learning Programme**

The Panel were interested to hear about the progress being made in relation to the provision for universal free school meals, community focused schools and additional learning needs. Hearing that 74 of the 80 schools works have been completed or have no works required, there are 2 remaining schools plus 5 where major projects are due to be completed by March 2025.

They were pleased to hear about the continued delivery of the capital maintenance programme including under both the Band A and B period and the continued maintenance on 68+ schools but did note that Welsh Government funding for education assets has been reduced from £3.6m to £0.83m. They were also interested to hear about the Local Development Plan Strategic Sites including potential new builds included in the strategic masterplans for Swansea and they look forward to seeing how these progress.

#### **Curriculum for Wales**

The Panel heard about the progress and the challenges that have arisen in relation to the introduction of the Curriculum for Wales and how they are being addressed or mitigated. Councillors were also interested to hear about what is planned to continue to move this important agenda forward.

The Panel asked how schools across Swansea are working together to take forward the Curriculum for Wales across their clusters. They heard that nearly all schools in Swansea have a good grasp of the high-level statements that exist within the curriculum for Wales. Schools have used those themes to provide a really clear view of linear progression and what that looks like from 3 years old to 16 years old. Nearly all of our schools and settings provide practitioners with a clear shared understanding of progression. There are plans in place to deepen that work, so not just linear progression but vertically as well.

The Panel asked about the minority of schools in Wales where Estyn have identified that the Curriculum for Wales has not yet had a positive impact. They were told that one school in Swansea, when inspected, included a recommendation along those lines, but that is one out of all the inspections that took place and that five out of the overall fifty inspections across Wales. We heard that in reality it is a small number and those recommendations are pointing at the area of inclusion and/or the integration of the primary school in to the secondary school. The Panel were told it is about looking at how do we make those links even more explicit, it may also be that particular schools have some challenges in terms of, for example geography.

The Panel asked how we are ensuring a focus on pupils learning basic skills in this process of change to introduce the new curriculum. Councillors were told that more and more schools are going back to those basic skills and are making those explicit in

their school improvement plans but that is not happening everywhere. They heard that the curriculum needs to be implemented in a way that plans for all pupils and that previously we were governed by an accountability system that made us get to a measure. The Panel were encouraged to hear that now they are able look at the individual pupil and provide a much more bespoke curriculum and offer for each individual child.

Councillors also asked whether we are taking teachers with us on the journey to develop the Curriculum for Wales in Swansea schools. Hearing that in the daily conversations that the School Improvement Officers have with practitioners they are finding that teachers are still excited by curriculum for Wales, that they enjoy seeing and giving responsibility and ownership to the pupils.
