1. Introduction

1.1 The Tackling Poverty Scrutiny Inquiry Panel undertook an in-depth inquiry between April 2016 and February 2017. The Cabinet Member response and action plan are attached at Appendix B. The final report is attached at Appendix C.

- 1.3 The final stage of the scrutiny inquiry process is the follow up. It is at this point that the original panel reconvenes in order to assess the impact of the work.
- 1.4 The purpose of this report is to assist the panel as it seeks to answer the following three questions, each of which will be dealt with in detail below:

- What has changed since the report was presented to Cabinet?
- Have the agreed recommendations been implemented?
- What has been the impact of the scrutiny inquiry?

2. What has changed since the report was presented to Cabinet?

2.1 Since the inquiry concluded the following changes [to the measure] have taken place.

The Council's Tackling Poverty Strategy has been reviewed, redrafted and was agreed at Council on the 25th January, including the development of a simplified Council-wide Delivery Plan. The revised Tackling Poverty Strategy includes a definition of poverty, a vision for Swansea and supports tackling poverty as being everybody's business.

3. Have the agreed recommendations been implemented?

- 3.1 In responding to the inquiry an action plan was drawn up showing what steps would be taken to implement all of the scrutiny recommendations agreed by Cabinet (Appendix B).
- 3.2 The table at Appendix A shows progress against each recommendation and specifically:
 - the Cabinet decision in respect of each recommendation
 - the action taken / proposed to implement the recommendations
 - the responsible officer(s)
 - timescales involved

4. What has been the impact of the scrutiny inquiry?

4.1 The scrutiny inquiry has supported raising the profile of the tackling poverty agenda across the various departments of the Council. It has provided the role of a 'critical friend', supporting and reaffirming the direction of travel that the development of the revised Tackling Poverty Strategy took.

Understanding and awareness has been supported through the development of the Strategy's accompanying Delivery Plan, as well as endorsing the inclusion of actions to improve understanding and awareness of the key issues through staff and member training within the plan.

The inquiry engaged a number of partners and organisations to support the inquiry including, communities, The Bevan Foundation, Joseph Rowntree Foundation and Leeds Truth Commission, as well as internal stakeholders such as The Tackling Poverty Unit and Economic Regeneration. The input from these contributors has proved useful in the development of detail within the revised Tackling Poverty Strategy and Delivery Plan.

The inquiry has aided the revision of the Tackling Poverty Strategy and raised the profile of making tackling poverty everyone's business.

ACTION 2 is: NOT COMPLETED

Progress made:

An action to scope and develop this has been included in the Tackling Poverty Strategy Delivery Plan: "Consider the commissioning of an involvement and participation study for Swansea."

This will be taken forward based on the Truth Commission model. A presentation on the Poverty Truth Commission Model and proposed next steps for Swansea was given to the Poverty Reduction Policy Development Committee (PDC) during July 2018. The PDC approved and endorsed the next steps.

The Adult Prosperity and Well-Being Service attended the Poverty Truth Commission Facilitators Network Meeting in September to identify further good practice from other Poverty Truth Commissions in the UK, as a first step in commissioning a similar exercise for Swansea.

We are working closely with Martin Johnstone (Poverty Truth Commission UK Development) and Andrew Grinnell (Leeds Poverty Truth Commission) who have offered to directly support the initial steps in Swansea. A number of meetings with key stakeholders will be co-ordinated which either Martin, Andrew or both will facilitate. The meetings will establish the level of desire and commitment to developing a Poverty Truth Commission in Swansea.

We recognise that a successful Truth Commission model is one that is partnership owned with no hierarchy of power. All partners and community participants have an equal voice within the Truth Commission Model. It is therefore important that there is buy-in from partners and communities.

The consultation process was thorough, including engagement and responses from internal and external services that support people experiencing poverty, who also supported their users to participate.

The plans to develop a Swansea Truth Commission (See Action 2) will support all partners and community participants to have an equal voice and establish the mechanism for services to be co-produced (assuming buy-in from partners and communities and availability of necessary resources).

ACTION 6 is: COMPLETED

Progress made:

A commitment has been included within the Swansea Public Services Board Local Well-being Plan – Working Together to Build a Better Future. Within the 'Steps to be taken' for Stronger Communities, is a commitment to deliver a single public service approach to developing a thriving economy through the Swansea Bay City Region Economic Regeneration Strategy with alignment to the Council's Tackling Poverty Strategy, to ensure a thriving economy where the most disadvantaged people also can benefit.

The Poverty Strategy also supports the wider delivery of the Swansea Public Services Board Local Well-being Plan 'Working Together to Build a Better Future', including, but not exclusively, the examples given below:

The Early Years objective is supported by helping parents to develop skills, knowledge and confidence and access employment. This is also supported through the delivery of making every contact count.

The Poverty Strategy supports the delivery of the Live Well, Age Well objective by supporting people to access information, advice and help. Also by supporting people to learn, work and live well.

The Working with Nature objective is supported through the delivery of the Poverty Strategy to reduce inequalities so that everyone everywhere can use green spaces.

The Stronger Communities objective is supported through the Poverty Strategy actions to deliver non-judgemental advice and support services reducing the effects of the poverty premium including:

- Jobs are created and barriers to access them are overcome;
- Citizens gain skills and qualifications throughout their lifetime;
- Citizens can get the financial support that they have a right to;
- and people and communities have a voice in decisions that affect them.

The Poverty Strategy also supports the five ways of working, through balancing short and long term needs, preventing situations from becoming worse or happening in the first place, integrating with other plans such as the Well-being Plan, collaborating with other key services in the PSB, third sector, communities and business communities and involving those who experience poverty.

ACTION 7 is: STRONG PROGRESS MADE

Progress made:

Poverty awareness and supporting training for members and officers has been included in the Delivery Plan:

"Deliver training with members and officers to promote the poverty is everyone's business approach."

The timescales for delivery are:

Qtrs 3 and 4, development of training packages, Qtr 1 2019 Training roll out

Officers Poverty Awareness Training

Initial discussions have taken place with Corporate Training regards the feasibility of developing online mandatory training for officers accessible through the learning pool. Work to develop this will take place during Qtrs 3 and 4 with roll out anticipated during Qtr 1 2019.

Members Poverty Awareness Training

Options for bespoke members Poverty Awareness Training are being explored currently with roll-out anticipated during Qtr 3 or 4.

Fuel Poverty Training

The Adult Prosperity and Well-Being Service worked with National Energy Action Cymru to deliver Fuel Poverty Training to a range of key frontline staff supporting people in Swansea. The training was delivered in September with excellent feedback from participants. Attendees included internal staff from Housing, Poverty and Prevention and Social Services, and external staff from Hafal, SCVS, POBL/Gwalia, Coastal Housing and Include.

The Swansea Poverty Partnership Forum has assessed the consultation responses and incorporated partnership actions into its Action Plan.

Five Swansea Poverty Partnership Forum subgroups have been established. They are:

- Data and Welfare Reform
- Prosperity
- Asset Based Community Development
- Food
- Prevention

The subgroups meet to identify opportunities and establish and deliver on actions on behalf of the Forum. This directly supports the delivery of the Poverty Strategy Delivery Plan: "Work with the Poverty Partnership Forum to identify shared projects and KPIs to support the wider poverty prevention agenda."

The Poverty Truth Commission work will then support the development of outcomes driven by people experiencing poverty and feed into, and influence the work of the Swansea Poverty Partnership Forum.

ACTION 10 is: STRONG PROGRESS MADE - COMPLETED

Progress made:

These principles are supported by actions within the Tackling Poverty Strategy Delivery Plan. Examples of these are as follows:

- Work with partners and through the Regional Learning & Skills Partnership to focus on outcomes such as the incomes of participants and productivity of employers, not just qualifications achieved.
- Deliver Swansea's Beyond Bricks and Mortar principles across all our procurement processes to bring local benefit from service and construction contracts.

- Deliver employability programmes and work based learning help for local people to develop skills and access job opportunities/better paid roles/increased hours.
- Actively encourage employment practices that reduce poverty including living wage: The Council is actively working through the Safeguarding PDDC to agree a route map towards developing an Ethical Care Charter, which includes a commitment to move towards the living wage within the lifetime of this administration (2021).
- Develop an appropriate wage approach re traineeships and apprenticeships.
- Maximise skills and job opportunities from key developments such as City Deal.
