- Critical Incident Group Established made up of the two PSBs and Area Planning Board
- Awareness raising and Partnership focus
- Better Health based focus on treatment work
- Review of APB services and quick wins!
- Prevention, Treatment and enforcement re-balanced



Key Activities and Achievements VAWDASV

- Increased awareness in children and young people of the importance of safe, equal and healthy relationships
- Focusing on early intervention and prevention
- Providing victims with equal access to appropriately resourced, high quality, needs led, strength based, gender responsive services
- Increased focus on holding perpetrators to account and provide opportunities to change their behaviour based around victim safety
- Strategic links to Social Services Contextual Safeguarding



Key Activities and Achievements Evening & Night Time Economy

- Swansea a Purple Flag City since 2014 'first in Wales'
- Established Multi-Agency projects
- Early intervention approach tackling vulnerability
- Specialist Vulnerability Training among key stake-holders
- Feasibility Study complete setting out aspirations for the physical regeneration of Wind Street
- Increased activity for campaigns and key dates



Key Activities and Achievements Hate Crime and Community Tension Monitoring

- Multi-agency Community Cohesion Group meets quarterly in Swansea
- Partnership engagement across all diverse groups
- Awareness raising re reporting ongoing
- Tension indicators shared monthly to compare trends
- Victim focus through Restorative justice
