### WLGA Food Poverty Grant

Swansea Council has received £36,913 in revenue and £74,378 in capital funding from the Welsh Local Government Association (WLGA). The funding relates to the period 1<sup>st</sup> November 2019 to 31<sup>st</sup> March 2020 and must be claimed in full by 30<sup>th</sup> May 2020.

The purpose of the funding is to enable local authorities to:

- Support an increased number of people facing food poverty by extending existing food bank provision across each authority.
- The capital funding should support organisations to access, store and distribute additional supplies of good quality food, including good food surplus, in particular, larger amounts of fresh food, boosting the capacity of organisations to provide good quality, nutritious food to their customers. It can be used in a variety of ways to suit the requirements in each authority, for example but not limited to: purchasing fridges, freezers and cooking equipment.
- The revenue funding can be used in a variety of ways to suit the requirements of the authority. These might include funding and working with voluntary organisations, community groups and housing associations etc. to develop projects such as social supermarkets, community cafes, lunch clubs. It can be used to, for example, provide specialist support for taking forward initiatives such as outreach work, training for volunteers (e.g. food handling gualifications) and to build community resilience through cluster work and the development of food bank hubs which bring together a range of support services.
- It is expected that authorities may benefit from working collaboratively to • maximise the impact of this funding. Local Authorities are expected to work with local expertise who are already addressing food poverty and insecurity.
- Provision should not be turned down to individuals or organisations outside authority area.
- Funding has been allocated using the benefits data formula for the revenue • grant allocation and claimant count data formula for the capital grant allocation.

The proposal is to engage with food bank and other support providers from across Swansea to establish the local trends, needs and gaps in the provision so that priorities for the allocation of funding can be determined. The process for applications and allocations will be then established so that funding can be distributed efficiently and effectively.
